Post-16 News

This last term has been a busy one for Post-16. All of our UCAS applications are in and we are thrilled that so many students have offers for so many courses - from English at York to Architecture in East Anglia. All the Year 13 students have worked hard on their applications and we can't wait to see what comes next for them. Students not going to university are encouraged to use their weekly tutor slots to chat about careers, apprenticeships and CVs to get them off to a good start.

Drop-Down Days

Both Year 12 and Year 13 students had a morning off timetable to look at some of the pastoral support topics. This included work on resilience, exam preparation, revision and independent work. Year 12 also got signed up to a fantastic program called Unifrog which allows them to develop career ideas,



write personal statements and focus on their future. They can also use the program to record any extra-curricular activities they do. Year 13 students were able to spend some time looking at their next steps, either with a focus on finance and accommodation at university or in exploring apprenticeship and careers websites.

Enrichment

One of the most important parts of being in Post-16 is developing holistically both for university and apprenticeship applications and for developing important skills. To help this, we now have an enrichment programme where students can earn rewards for their extra-curricular activities, both in and out of school. Many of the in-school activities our students do will count towards this and they can record them on Unifrog, making any future applications much more straight-forward. Any students who do out of school activities are encouraged to let us know as well.

School Council

We are looking for ways to improve students' time in Post-16 and one of the ways to do this is to increase student leadership (which also counts towards their enrichment as well) so we are looking for a team of Year 12 students to form a new and improved Post-16 School Council. If you are interested, let Miss Cracknell know before Easter. Students have also been sent a questionnaire about Post-16 and we would be grateful for any remaining replies. Look out for opportunities to get involved in all aspects of the Post-16 centre in the coming months too.

Speakers in Schools

Speakers in Schools is a country wide scheme designed to allow students in schools to experience talks from people who have excelled in their field and can offer passionate and detailed lectures on their specialisms. We were lucky enough to be able to celebrate International Women's Day and careers week with a talk by Brett Rogers – director of The Photography Gallery in London. All Year 12 and Year 13 art students



were in the audience along with some of our most gifted Year 10 and Year 11 artists. Having been awarded an OBE for services to photography and the arts, Brett told us about her career and the gallery and offered some wonderful activities for our students. Mr Goddard and Miss Cracknell will be looking into taking students on a visit to the gallery in the summer term.

Mocks and National Examinations

Year 13 are well underway with revision and mocks and are looking forward to being able to do the first national exams of their school careers. Year 12 students will have their summer exams towards the end of June and we will work with them in form time to help them prepare for these.

Student Achievement

We always like to celebrate our students' achievements in school and out. This term, we wanted to share with you the fantastic work done by Leah, one of our Year 12 students. A gifted artist, Leah has been working with one of the teachers at a local infant school and has painted all the illustrations for a fantastic book, called Cornelius Cloud, aimed at helping young children understand the pandemic and its impact. The illustrations are whimsical and perfect for the story and we couldn't be more proud of Leah now becoming a published illustrator.







Subject Focus

One of the problems Year 10 and Year 11 students often face is making their choices for their studies once they come into Post-16. Students in Year 9 who are making their option choices might also want to explore their options so they can make the right choices to support their goals. To help this, each newsletter there will be a subject focus so that students can get a little flavour of what Post-16 subjects can offer them. Even a known subject such as English can be very different once you get into Post-16. This term, our focus is psychology but if you would like to know more about any of the courses and options we offer at Post-16 then please get in touch with Miss Cracknell or Mrs Brighton in Post-16.

Psychology

Psychology is the study of the brain, mind and behaviour and tries to help us understand why we do what we do. In this subject you will study a total of 11 units including memory, attachment, relationships and psychopathology. Over the course of the two year qualification you will develop a wide range of skills which will help you in any further career - for example you will learn about how children attach to their caregivers, which could help if you wanted to go into nursing - and every single university course accepts psychology A level - even things like medicine, veterinary science or physics! As it is a science you will learn how psychologists go about studying the brain and behaviour and you will have the chance to do your own mini experiments to see if, for example, listening to music or watching TV helps you to learn. Psychology goes with any other combination of A levels or BTECs but goes particularly well with sport, biology, history and criminology. To succeed in psychology at A level, you need to have got a minimum of 5 grade 4-9 at GCSE and these must include science (or biology) and, if you have studied it, you must have passed history. It is preferable if you have achieved at least a grade 5 in English too as this will help you with the assessments in psychology.



Subject Focus continued

<u>What our students say.</u>

Orlagh in Year 12 said :

Learning about social influence has been the most interesting thing for me so far because you can understand so many things that you had noticed yourself and others doing but had previously accepted as 'normal'. The biggest challenge with psychology A level is the fact that it is a completely new subject, you don't have any background information or knowledge, so having to write essays at the start can be quite challenging. Doing biology as well will definitely help in future lessons/ topics as it does cover a bit on the brain. For essay writing, English and History have helped, but ultimately I have felt that this subject is very different to any others as its based on explaining behaviour and looking at theories and studies, so I don't think that there is any single subject that is necessary to help you study psychology.

Evie, also in Year 12 said:

I think that psychology will be useful in day to day life just by explaining certain things that I might do or feel. If I go into a career which involves helping/talking to someone, I think it will be really useful for that. The most interesting thing in psychology is definitely the first topic we did which was social influence. We study what conformity is and how people conform in day-to-day life. Also, obedience and how people's professions can influence their decisions. The biggest challenge is probably the independent learning needed in Post-16 courses, including psychology, finding those methods to help myself find it easier. The GCSE subject that has helped me in psychology is English. Psychology is very essay based and you really need that language and ability to lay out an assessment. Even if you don't know what you want to do, psychology may help in life with mental health or when others are struggling or acting a certain way. It might help me because I've been wondering if I want to be a child therapist or an art therapist.

Student Work Experience

Lily, a Year 11 student, recently went to work at Nottingham Trent University's Radiological and Radiochemical department for a week. Dr Nick Evans showed her the ropes and allowed her to see what to expect in a career in nuclear physics.

After some safety training on the first day, Lily was given the opportunity to conduct cutting-edge research into how the radioactivity of soil samples from the Chernobyl exclusion zone can be mitigated by the growing of certain plants.

The research took a whole week and in that time Lily was able to use high tech equipment including a germanium detector, a radon detector, ____

and a vortex mixer. She was also given the responsibility of mixing compounds, measuring the radioactivity of samples, analysing data from experiments and last but not least, looking cool in a lab coat!

Dr Evans will be publishing the results of Lily's contributions in the scientific journal Radiochimica Acta.
