Measure	Activity
Priority 1	Ensure every pupil can access remote education, homework and their Microsoft Teams account.
Priority 2	Move from streamed classes in English, Maths and Science to a model that has a 'top set and then 'mixed sets' underneath.
Barriers to learning these priorities address	Disadvantaged pupils will need to be loaned laptop computers for the duration of their time at Aldercar High School.
Projected spending	£83,070 to fund an extra class in each year group and two extra classes in year 7 English and Maths.

Priority 1	Ensure all disadvantaged pupils are seen first by the careers advisor provided by DANCOP
Priority 2	Ensure disadvantaged pupils are targeted for behavioural support.
Barriers to learning these priorities address	Disadvantaged pupils with have raised aspirations for their future self and have their pathway mapped for them by the schools career advisor. Students will have access to additional opportunities to study the basics out of school time. Pupils who appear on interventions lists for attendance or behaviour are prioritised for speedy intervention programmes.
Projected spending	£15,680
