Peer mentors and PHSE

This term we have started a project to develop some of our Year 12 students as peer mentors. Following two training sessions with Alison Hill from Derbyshire County Council, they are now ready to do a mentoring project with Year 9 students in the New Year. This is a real opportunity to gain some valuable experience plus to give back to other students in the school.

Subject focus: Criminology

Criminology is the study of criminological theories, crime and court processes. It is comprised of half coursework and half exam and allows students to develop their understanding of processes of law, criminal cases and criminal behaviours. It is an excellent course for students wishing to go into the police service but has links with all manner of careers from law, policing, public services and teaching to forensics and psychology. This term students have been looking at 'crime scene to courtroom' and, amongst other things, have created shoebox crime scenes and carried out a mock trial of Superman (he was innocent!!).


In Year 9, emotions threatened to boil over in a tumultuous final. In thrilling scenes, Cole vaulted to victory!

Engineering competition

At the start of the year Mr Gillies entered Aldercar High School Year 11 engineers into a multi-school competition run by Cullum Detuners, a Heanorbased company who make silencers and air intakes for industrial, military and aerospace organisations, including NASA.

The students jumped at the opportunity, as Cullum are very supportive of Aldercar High School, by providing many students with apprenticeships, work experience and facility tours etc.

The aim of the competition was to produce a Bee Hotel, specifically for a sub-species of bee called the Mason Bees, which are quite scarce. These bees like to make their nests in naturally occurring gaps such as between cracks in stones or other small dark cavities.

Winning hotels were to be installed in a memorial garden for one of their late directors of Cullum Detuners, thus adding even greater credence to the cause. Back in September, the engineering classroom became a hive of activity, with the workers getting the buzz and working effectively in their swarms. There was no winging-it as the students earned their stripes by producing specifications for three distinctly different hotels - The Cottage, The Factory and The Tower Block. All were to bee constructed from scrap/ upcycled materials in the spirit of sustainability. They took shape in no time at all thanks to the help of our own Queen Bees - Mrs Holmes and Mrs Feely. Once completed the students added the expert touch, in the form of some CNC-produced personalised messages & decoration.

The panel at Cullum were suitably impressed and we stung the opposition! Not only did we defeat the other schools, the panel at Cullum were that pleased with the final hotels that they decided to award every student the honey, in the form of a £20 Amazon voucher each - a total of £360!
