### Post-16 news

### <u>UCAS</u>

With exams over and Year 13 just waiting for their results, it's been time to focus our preparation for the future on Year 12. To support them in deciding what is best for them Post-18, we have had a number of events. This started with a University visit and drop down day way back in February and we were pleased to welcome NTU in again to deliver workshops on choosing a university and writing a personal statement. All Year 12 students have been invited to mentoring with Miss Cracknell or Mrs Brighton to support them as they head into their last year of schooling. A further university visit and other workshops, including one for parents, will be happening in the autumn term. All students have been asked to use their summer to research potential courses, apprenticeships and degrees and we can't wait to get them started on their next steps journey.

### Oddballs

In May, we invited in the Oddballs charity to talk to our young people about testicular cancer as part of the PHSE programme focusing on health and wellbeing. It was a really informative talk and raised awareness of issues around teen and young person's health. We look forward to seeing them again next year. Alongside this, we will be welcoming the school nurse in to focus on mental health in July and, in September, the local policing team will be delivering workshops on safety, misogyny and staying safe.

### **Exams**

It feels like exams have been going on forever with the Year 12 exams in April followed closely by A-levels. We would like to congratulate all our Post-16 students on their conduct and attitude towards exams and in particular, our Year 12 students on a fantastic set of mock results. Once in Year 13 there will be further mock opportunities to ensure our students are as well prepared as possible for their external exams in 2025.

### Induction

On what was the hottest day of the year, we welcomed in our Year 11 students for the second of their two induction mornings, a chance to find out more, confirm choices and collect summer work. Students still wishing to come who might not yet have applied are welcome to apply through the website or see Miss Cracknell on results day to find out more. Year 12 begin school on Monday 9th September where they will have a full day of activities before starting lessons on Tuesday 10th September.

### Blended pathway

Year 10 (soon to be 11) will have a range of opportunities to introduce them to Post-16 starting, for some at the end of this term with a taster in Post-16. Details will come out in the new term about open evenings, tasters, interviews and other events to help our students make the right choices at Post-16.

As an exciting new addition to our offer, Year 11 students next year will have the opportunity to apply for our unique blended learning course. This 3 year programme allows students who don't quite meet the usual entry requirements for level 3 (5 grade 4 and above) but still have aspirations to do A-levels, Level 3 BTECS and progress to university, to complete a bespoke selection of additional level 2 courses and one level 3 course in Year 12 followed by 2 further level 3 courses in Year 13 which will be completed at the end of Year 14. This is a fantastic opportunity for those students who traditionally might not have been able to attend sixth form to complete level 3 courses as a stepping stone to university. ### 3 year Aspirations Pathway

### Who is it for?

- This pathway is for students with high aspirations who, for whatever reason, may not achieve enough GCSE grades for entry into other post-16 routes but still aspire to complete A levels and other post-16 courses and aim to go to university, higher apprenticeships or into academic professions.
- Entry requirements are just two grade 4's or above (in any subjects) plus English or English literature at grade 4 or above.

### What will you study?

### Year 12

- Resit GCSE maths (where appropriate)
- · 2 further level 2 qualifications such as animal care
- Begin one level 3 qualification (usually an applied course such as sport, art, health and social or criminology)
- Unit awards from AQA to build skills alongside bespoke independent learning units.

### Year 13

- · Complete the second year of your first level 3 option
- · Begin 2 further level 3 courses chosen according to need and GCSE results
- · Further Unit awards to build skills
- · Pastoral and academic support from tutors and pastoral staff

### Year 14

- Complete remaining two level 3 courses
- Continuing pastoral and academic support
- Support to apply for university and higher apprenticeships
- Dedicated weekly work experience time

### What could it lead to?

### University

A wide variety of university courses would be open to you dependent on success in level 3 courses

### Higher level apprenticeships

Many apprenticeships are only open to students who have studied at post-16, these often pay more and have better prospects.

### Degree Apprenticeships

Fully funded and paid apprenticeships with day release to university, often in the forces or police and other services.

### Bronze, Silver and Gold awards

We are really proud of our Year 7 students for their positive contribution to school life as well as their commitment and dedication to learning so we are keen to reward them during our weekly assemblies. # y School attendance update September 2024



## Attendance categories

95 to 100% - as expected

91 to 94% - at risk of persistent absence 80 to 90% - persistent absence 51 to 79% - at risk of severe absence Less than or equal to 50% - severe absence

### Support first approach

Missing school means children fall behind. This not only impacts on their future achievement, but also adds additional stress and worry as the pupil attempts to catch up. This can affect their mental health and that of their family.

Schools will always try to offer support to remove barriers to attendance before considering any form of legal intervention however they can only do this with the support of parents. If you do not engage with this support the school may feel that they have no choice than to request the Local Authority consider taking legal action against you for failure to secure your child's regular attendance at school under section 444(1) of the Education Act 1996



# Penalty Notice Fines for School Attendance are Changing

With the introduction of the new National Framework for Penalty Notices, the below changes will come into force for Penalty Notice Fines for unauthorised absence after 19th August 2024 Education Penalty Notices are issued to the parents of statutory school age children and can be issued to each parent or carer who is deemed liable for the child's absence from school.



The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be: E160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.

Reduced to £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days.

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Second Offence (within 3 years)

The second time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be: £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.



he third time an offence is committed for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case will be presented straight to he Magistrates' Court. Magistrates' fines can be up to £2500 per parent, per child.

## Can my child take a holiday in term time?

The simple answer is NO - pupils can only take leave of absence during term time if this is approved in advance by the school. Leave taken without permission may result in a penalty

notice and or prosecution.

### Aldercar and Langley Mill Community event

On Friday 5th July, the school hosted a large-scale community event where a number of our community partners visited the school Sports Hall and put on a fantastic roadshow for students to attend.

Students were able to take part in numerous activities throughout the morning including wearing beer googles and seeing the effects of alcohol on the body, getting advice on sporting opportunities available in the community over the summer holidays and taking part in rope throws with the fire service. We would like to extend a huge thank you to our local PSCO Alfie Smith for organising the event and for his work with the school and our local community.













### Year 7 London trip

At the end of June, forty-four Year 7 students travelled to London for two days of activities all related to the English curriculum. The trip introduced students to some examples of careers which studying English could take them to, and allowed them to develop their understanding of literature and its reference to the real world. Here is what one of our students wrote about it;

On Tuesday we visited The Globe Theatre. We watched the actors warm up for their show and then enjoyed a drama workshop focused on the Shakespeare play Macbeth. Here in the library, we took part in Empathy Day on Thursday 6th June - an



annual celebration designed to develop empathy in children through reading and sharing books. As part of the Empathy Day activities, there were displays of the Read for Empathy collection of books as well as drawing and colouring activities, and students were invited to make empathy resolutions using the bunting provided by the Empathy Lab. We also had a live screening of a special assembly with Michael Rosen at lunchtime, explaining the role books can have in promoting empathy in young people.

### Science trip to the Space Centre

The Year 8 students got to relive their space topic from Year 7 by exploring The National Space centre. The Space Centre had interactive galleries which allowed students to get hands on with, discovering the past, present, and future of space exploration. They all especially enjoyed the planetarium which provoked lots of "wows" and mesmerised students. Our students were a pleasure to take, all staff and students had a fantastic day.











### Expectation cards

This term we have introduced the expectation cards into school. These have been a great success.
